THIS WEEK'S DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- When it comes to suicide, the Bible not only talks about it but provides a story of suicide prevention in Acts 16:22–28. What was the hope Paul provided the jailer?
- In speaking with someone who is despondent and possibly considering suicide, what steps can you take? How might the compassion of Jesus in Matthew 11:28 guide you in such a critical time?
- Read Ruth 1–4. Where do you see the idea that "It won't always be this way" in the story of Naomi & Ruth?
- In Genesis 2:18–23, we read that Adam was alone and that God considered that issue for His resolve. Why is it not good to be alone? Why is this concept critical to suicide prevention?
- We know from the pages of the Bible that God has promised to never leave us or forsake us. He is always present. How might that same idea prove valuable to someone who is facing a time of despair and hopelessness?



Suicide is a difficult topic. Yet we are not called to have all the answers. In fact, God simply encourages us to model His example of being present in times of need. As a believer, are you willing to take on a ministry of presence to help someone around you who is facing despair and hopelessness?
